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Foreword by the Resident Representative

2019 was a pivotal year marked not only by my new function as Resident Representative of UNFPA in Burkina Faso, but also coinciding with two major events: the fiftieth anniversary of UNFPA and the twenty-fifth anniversary of the International Conference on Population and Development. These events were an opportunity to celebrate the successes of UNFPA and allowed us to highlight the main contributions of UNFPA in Burkina Faso since the doors first opened in 1973 with the first population census.

2019 was also marked by the completion of the enumeration of the fifth population census for which data processing is ongoing. In addition, two sub-offices were established making it possible to strengthen the package of humanitarian interventions in Burkina Faso. A monitoring exercise of unallocated funding between UNFPA and Member States of the United Nations System was conducted under the leadership of the Embassy of Luxembourg as part of the project « Improving collaboration between United Nations Member States and United Nations Development Entities in some Program Countries of Africa». In December 2019, a long-standing project funded by Belgium since 2016 came to an end.

This project called «Acceleration of the realization of sexual and reproductive health rights in Burkina Faso», has, amongst other things, allowed for the revolutionization of adolescents and youth reproductive health through innovative information and communication technologies using a platform known as «QG Jeune».

This 2019 annual report of the 8th Cooperation Program reflects the efforts of the United Nations Population Fund in Burkina Faso and all of its partners to work together for the improvement of the quality of life of women, men, boys and girls in Burkina Faso. Despite the difficult security situation, everyone remained committed to our common objectives; for that, I would like to express my sincere gratitude and respect in particular to the UNFPA country team for our collective achievements. I would also like to say thank you and congratulations to the Ministry of the Economy, Finance and Development and all our implementing partners of 8th program not only for the quality of the collaboration but for all the hard work carried out over the course of 2019. Lastly, I want to commend a year of robust inter UN Agency cooperation here in Burkina Faso, that I know will continue to strengthen in the years to come.


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


Background:

In Burkina Faso, contraceptive prevalence has progressed gradually from 8% in 1993 to 24% in 2015 according to national surveys realized by the National Institute of Statistics and Demography. Unmet needs for family planning went from 29% in 2003 to 19% in 2015. The unmet needs for spacing births are estimated at 14% against 5.1% for unmet needs to limiting births. Overall, since 1990, family planning programs have been implemented in a favorable political and socioeconomic environment.







The number of couple years of protection achieved is the result of enormous efforts to create demand, supply and access to services, as well as the availability of a diverse range of contraceptive products. This contributes not only to the achievement of the objectives of the National economic and social development plan 2016-2020 (PNDES) but also those of the National plan to accelerate family planning 2017-2020 (PNAPF).





midwifery institutions supported

Support to midwifery institutions has constituted mainly of capacity building for training schools through: (i) provision of equipment in anatomical medico-technical models laboratories; (ii) updating supervisors at internship sites on best practices in emergency obstetric and newborn care (EmONC), family planning (FP), fistulas and female genital mutilation (FGM); (iii) post-training follow-up, revision of curricula, as well as provision of reference documents and rolling stock.



317 new family planning users recruited through innovative strategies, including 45,747 during the national family planning week and 4930 through « Macopine» strategy.



National Family Planning Week is an opportunity to conduct high-level advocacy and strong social mobilization in favor of family planning. It takes place for a week throughout the national territory and is characterized by free provision of family planning services. In 2019, the official launch of the week was made by the Wife of the Prime Minister.



The strategy



«My girlfriend»

approach is a strategy developed for offering reproductive health services in rural areas, including family planning and is built around midwives who intervene in health centers but who also participate in creating demand and providing services in the field directly with women's groups.










Background:

Since 1973, United Nations Population Fund has worked alongside of the government of Burkina Faso to improve maternal and children health. This contributed to the continuous decline of maternal mortality in Burkina Faso. Maternal mortality ratio fell from 566 deaths per 100,000 live births in 1991 to 330 per 100,000 in 2015. This corresponds to a reduction in maternal mortality of 42%.





Background:

In Burkina Faso, child marriage is still very common. In 2015, 49% of girls were married before the age of 18. The situation is improving over time.


In 2003, this rate was estimated at 57.5%. As for female genital mutilation, we note that the percentage of girls aged 0-14 years excised decreased from 13.2% in 2010 to 11.3% in 2015.











To save girls from child marriage, a protection system is put in place. This system is made up of several people. These are mainly:

Village of Doffi, Burkina Faso, July 2019. Aminata, 30 years-old, is pursued by armed individuals. Exhausted from the running and the fear, her legs no longer carry her. She stumbles and falls. She is caught and raped by one of them. Defiled, destitute and for fear of being repudiated by her husband, she decides to endure the pain alone without ever talking about it.

"I feel really good since I got to see the doctor because I didn't sleep at night, I relived the scene every time I closed my eyes and I was very scared. I was suffering alone and couldn't tell anyone about it. But after talking to the doctor I can sleep now." Today Aminata is a woman freed from the weight of the silence of rape.

World Population Day








